Measurable Unit Outcomes

Novel Study

- Knowledge: Students will be able to recall elements of the assigned novel.
- Comprehension: Students will discuss the novel in a literature circle.
- Application: Students will complete a literature web to outline key elements of the text.
- Analysis: Students will compare the characters within the novel to individuals in society.
- Evaluation: Students will justify events in the book and will evaluate current events as they relate to the storyline.
- Synthesis: Students will formulate an new story using current events as the basis.

<u>Vocabulary</u>

- Knowledge: Students will look up vocabulary words in a print dictionary or online.
- Comprehension: Students will classify words by origin.
- Application: Students will use vocabulary words in a sentence.
- Analysis: Students will find similarities in words by analyzing suffixes, prefixes, and roots.
- Evaluation: Students will select words to display on the word wall and explain the reason for their selection.
- Synthesis: Using suffixes, prefixes and roots, students will create their own word.

Genre Study

- Knowledge: Students will recall the various types of genre.
- Comprehension: Students will identify genre and explain the qualities of each type.
- Application: Students will demonstrate that they know the criteria for specific genre.
- Analysis: Students will find similarities between genres.
- Evaluation: Students select stories based on genre and will support how each meets the specific criteria.
- Synthesis: Students will write their own stories.

Writing

- Knowledge: Students will demonstrate basic writing process: pre-write, edit, revise.
- Comprehension: Students will describe the writing process as it relates to their assignment.
- Application: Students will write a persuasive, informal, or business writing piece.
- Analysis: Students will compare their writing to others in the class or as researched.
- Evaluation: Students will appraise their work using a self-evaluation tool.
- Synthesis: Students will create their own writing piece.
